The effect was fascinating to watch and the children learnt all about how the sun evaporates the rain back up into the sky and what happens when the clouds become dark and too heavy to hold onto the raindrops any longer.

Undeterred by the question, Mrs Fox decided to take matters into her own hands and remove her socks and shoes to take toe print samples that she then compared with the children in order to answer the initial question.

French Rap and National Identity Seminar

Last Monday, 3 Senior school students (Edie Y13, Mila Y12, Arthur Y11) attended a French seminar on “French rap and national identity” given by Professor Eleanor Hodgson, a former University of Exeter lecturer in French, hosted by Taunton School.

The event was open to all the local schools, to students currently studying French, French natives or anyone else interested. The interactive session was given in a mixture of French and English, at a level accessible to all. We listened to snippets of some key French rap,

learning about the cultural background of the rappers, as well as learning key French vocabulary and context around the subject.



It was a really interesting talk, and eye opening to see how profoundly French culture and national identity impacts French rap, and how many of the French rappers are socially committed in their lyrics to raising awareness about key social and political issues happening in France.

Lucky recipients of Wild Alaska Salmon



We were delighted to be one of only 250 schools in the UK that received wild Alaska pink salmon, courtesy of the Food Teachers Centre and Alaska Seafood UK.

Queen's College was one of the lucky schools to receive some of the 10,000 salmon fillets that were sent out to schools! It's part of the 'Fish Heroes' project, which is an initiative that encourages young people to learn about, cook and taste fish. Pupils also learnt about the health benefits of fish in the diet, as well as aspects of food sustainability and food provenance.

Mr Mann, Head of Food and Nutrition said, "children in the UK eat on average just 84g of fish products a week, of which only 21g is oily fish - way below the recommendation of two portions a week. It has been an amazing experience - from the delivery, cooking and tasting of Alaska pink salmon. Pupils have really enjoyed their time and have learnt many important high-level food preparation skills".

Mrs Barker, Food Teacher said she was, "thrilled that we have been selected to receive the wild salmon from Alaska. It means that our students can not only learn about wild fisheries and the different tastes, textures and usages but also cook with the fish themselves".

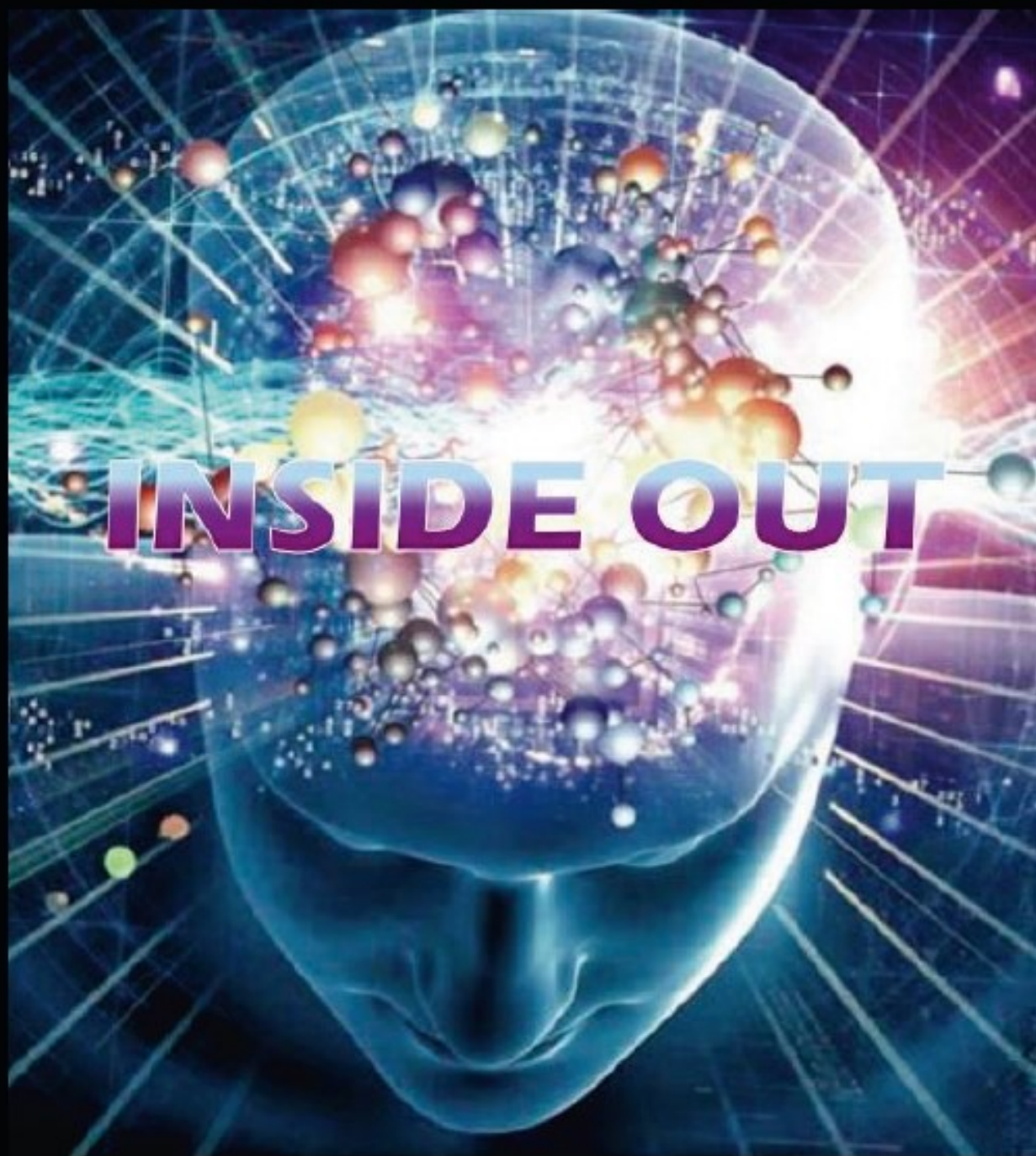

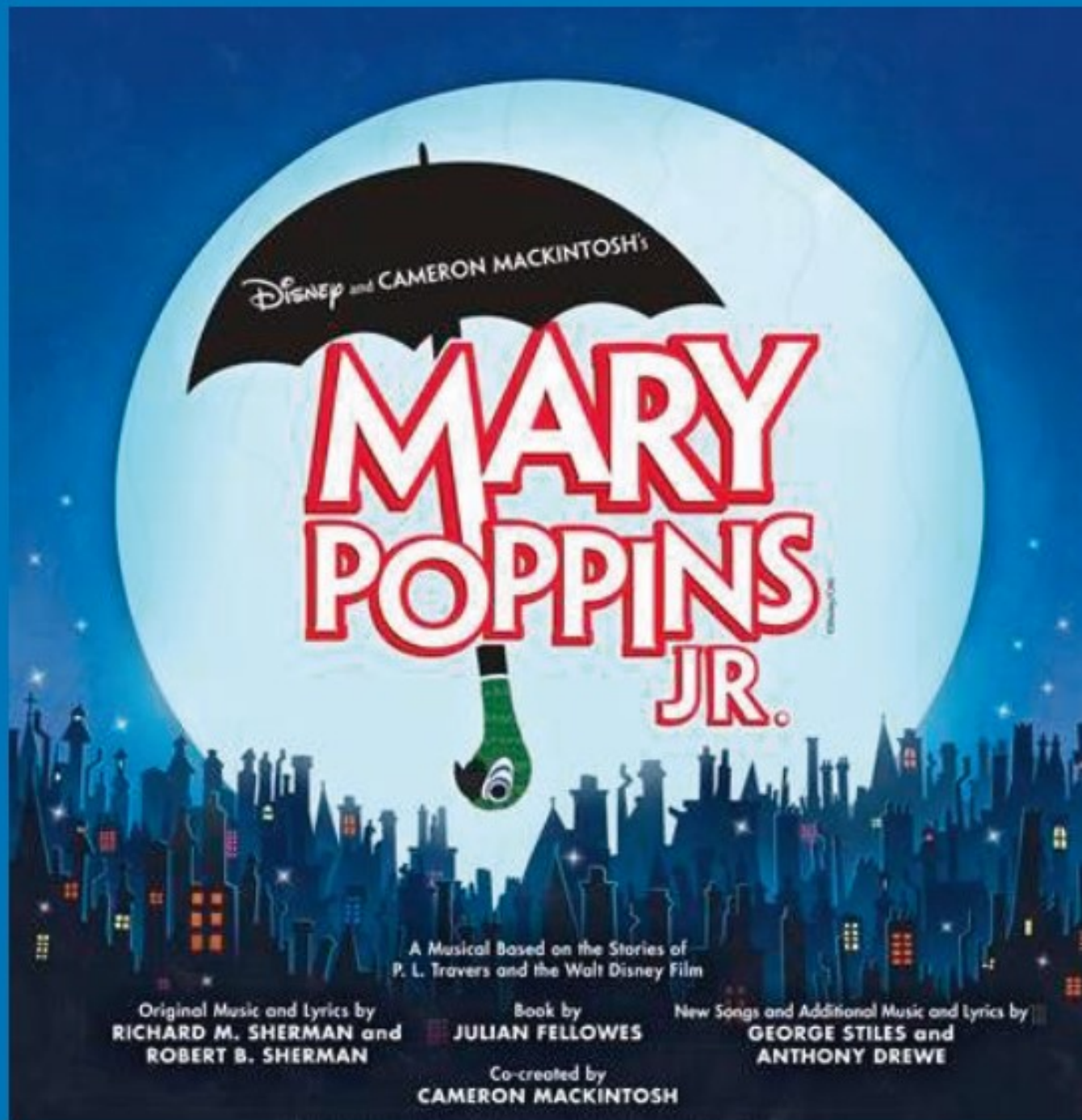
