One round even had them using polygons to estimate values of pi. The team consisting of Adam, Alfie, Jason and Karis did amazingly well on the logic true


or false questions and

#### Choral Evensong - Sunday 19 March 2023

Last Sunday, the College Choir had the opportunity and privilege to sing Choral Evensong at Taunton Minster, the large and beautiful church in the heart of Taunton. Evensong is one of the main services of the Anglican church and the sections of the texts have been set to music by English composers for centuries.

Following a detailed and constructive rehearsal (and refreshments kindly provided by the Minster staff), the choir led the service at 5.00pm. Sung elements included Psalm 31, the Preces and Responses set by Reading, the Magnificat and Nunc Dimittis in D minor by Walmisley and the anthem, 'Hear My Prayer' by Mendelssohn, featuring soloists Karen and Fallon. The Choir performed magnificently, coping with this range of cathedral standard music

Spring Concert - 19 March 2023



What a stellar night of music! The ensembles of Queen's College were out in force to show what they are capable of and they certainly did not disappoint! In fact it started before the concert technically as the Chamber Ensemble played movement from the Water Music by Handel to the gathering audience in the foyer. The concert kicked off with the String Orchestra in fine fettle; a sprightly rendition of the first movement of the Albinoni Oboe concerto in D minor featuring skilled oboist Georgie was followed by a lush and warm rendition of the Pavane Pour Une Infante Défunte. They then returned to the Baroque with movements from Bach's Orchestral Suite in B minor with Head Girl Pippa as soloist. The ensemble was tight and controlled, especially in the fiendish Badinerie. Next up were the Concert Choir, made up exclusively from Year 7 and 8 pupils; performing all their music from memory, the audience enjoyed three varied pieces sung very well, 'Bruce' from the musical Matilda, 'Blackbird' by the Beatles and a Jackson 5 mashup.





This ensemble is certainly one to watch in the future! In their first outing the Junior String Quartet played with confidence and

panache in their arrangement of 'Over The Rainbow'. Finishing off the first half, the College Choir performed two pieces with their usual professionalism; 'Hear My Prayer' by Mendelssohn, with solos from Karen and Fallon, and a lively arrangement of 'Viva La Vida' by Coldplay.

A short interval later, the second half was kicked off by the Senior String Quartet were in fine form with a very entertaining Una Bow Serenade by Haydn (played with one bow between four!) followed by a stylish and suave Havana by Cabello. The Chamber Choir provided two pieces with a brilliant level of balance and clarity; 'O Sing Joyfully' by Batten and an upbeat arrangement of 'I've Got Rhythm' by Gershwin. The Middle School Orchestra took to the stage with their well prepared and engaging performances of highlights from 'Harry Potter' by Williams, Lloyd-Webber's 'Pie Jesu' and the finale from the New World Symphony by Dvorak. Rounding off the evening, Wind Band took to the stage and performed four pieces with consummate skill and musicship; the theme from 'Mission Impossible', the Washington Post, a smooth Arioso by Bach and finishing with a rousing 'Everybody Needs Somebody'.

A packed and varied concert programme, it was thoroughly enjoyed by the audience and certainly shows the high standards of music that Queen's is renowned for.

#### Queen's Hosts MUN Conference



Last weekend, Queen's had the privilege of hosting QUMUN 2023 - this is the Model United Nations conference for Queen's. We had an amazing turnout of over 100 people committing to arrive early Saturday morning. The atmosphere of the event and the various committees was very professional and we were very pleased with how all delegates presented themselves. The opening ceremony was an incredible experience and our guest speaker, Dr Chris McMurdo gave a fantastic speech about his life in diplomacy.

Model United Nations is a re-enactment of the United Nations for students where the premise is that the students themselves organise, run and chair the event. The various committees look at world issues and delegates debate these issues from the viewpoint of the countries which have been allocated to them. This of course may mean that students (delegates) have to adopt views they may not share themselves personally.

The idea is that a resolution is built by the committee; clauses are submitted and debated by the delegates and then the resolution is debated as a whole. It will then pass or fail and replicates the process undertaken by the United Nations. The last event of the day is the General Assembly; a fictional emergency scenario (which is loosely based on possible real world events) is placed before the delegates and again, the countries try to build a resolution to resolve that situation. The group of delegates were made up of over 100 students from a variety of different schools and colleges from the South West and Wales together with 10 of our own students. The day was full of intellectual and fruitful debate which culminated in a lively General Assembly on the fictional scenario of North Korea landing a missile in South Korea. All of the material was drafted and chaired by our own Queen's students, the quality of which was commented on by visiting staff and students alike.

We were thrilled that QUMUN is back on the MUN map and that students from across the South West, including an increasing number from Queen's itself, are enjoying the opportunity to lobby, debate and speak publically about the issues that will ultimately shape their world in years to come.

### Sixth Form



Queen's College was visited by Dr Guy Sutton, director of Medical Biology Interactive and honorary consultant assistant professor at the University of Nottingham Medical School. Dr Sutton has run Brain Day for our biology and psychology students for many years. Dr Sutton spoke with the students and enhanced their knowledge of the structure of the brain and the neuroscience of consciousness and death.

Year 13 then explored the effects of cannabis and ketamine on the brain both short and long term and its ability to adapt and change when affected by lack of sleep, brain damage and substance abuse. Students were then able to see a sheep dissection where they were able to examine the specimen pieces up close.






In the final lecture, Dr Sutton talked about advancements in neuro-technology, the future possibility of telepathy – to many pupils' amazement – and how the brain can be linked to crime.

There was an opportunity to ask many varied questions about brain anatomy and mental disorders, among many other topics.

Dr Sutton then spoke with year 11 and 12 scholars about the future advancements of the brain and the possible technology that we could be using in the coming years. As always his talk was informative and appreciated by all students that attended.

A Level Trip to see the Diamond Light Source



On Tuesday, fifteen of our A-level science pupils went on an expedition to discover how a gigantic particle accelerator is being used to solve science, engineering and historical problems at one of the UK's largest collaborative scientific projects, the <u>Diamond Light Source</u> (DLS) at the Harwell Science and Innovation Campus near Oxford.

Earlier in the year we were lucky enough to win a ballot for a place on one of the rare school tours of the DLS, which is not normally open to the public. # OQ Reunion

Old Queenians 20 Years on ...



On the evening of 18 March, the Wyvern Hall was packed and buzzed with the animated chatter of 90 people from the moment they arrived until it was time to leave five hours later. For some, the conversation had begun in the afternoon with a tour of the school and many extended the occasion into the early hours of the morning at a popular venue in town. These were school friends who had left Queen's between 1998 and 2002.

The leavers of 2000 had planned to marked 20 years as OQs with a reunion in 2020 but the pandemic put pay to that. The death of one of their number, **Lucy Broadley (1993-2000)**, last year prompted them to revive the idea. In tribute to Lucy they decided to make the event not only a social occasion but an opportunity to raise money for the Foundation, specifically to help past pupils who encounter mental health issues, problems of addiction, bereavement or life-changing hardship.



This initiative originated from and was driven by **Miranda Shearer (1995-2000)** whose energy and determination ensured the idea was realised. The credit for a hugely successful event is hers.

During the dessert course an auction of 11 lots was held which those in the room engaged with enthusiastically. Bids for items as varied as a dinner date for two, one night stays in an 18<sup>th</sup> century home, a dumpy bag of logs and a one-hour massage raised over £1200. Entertainment was included with comedy provided by Laura Lex who kept energies high with some laughs, and **Jon Patchitt (1993-98)** and his band who provided some music at the latter end of the evening.

On display were pictures of sports teams, drama productions, house events, trips abroad, DoE expeditions, artwork and so on featuring many, if not

all, of those at the reunion. Of particular interest, at least those to featured, were facial photos of all the leavers of 2000, collected in two large glassframed boards. It's always fun to be reminded of what you looked in school like uniform.
