

Food for Thought: Future of our Food System



This week our scholar pupils had a lively and timely debate on the future of our food system and what's really needed to get ourselves and our planet into shape.

The way we produce food is putting at risk future food production, "the success of the food system goes hand in hand with its destructive power" concluded the UK's top food strategist, former lead board member at DEFRA, author of the National Food Strategy and co-founder of the restaurant chain, Leon, Henry Dimbleby MBE, in his new book called, RAVENOUS that the pupils reviewed.

In class, they critiqued the key issues from this book about the future of our food system and also critically reviewed current alarming headlines on the climate change impact of food production, ultra-processed foods, obesity figures, Covid, Brexit, the war in Ukraine, the soaring cost of energy-disrupted supply chains, and empty supermarket shelves. Pupils engaged directly with practical ideas of how to overcome key barriers including of affordability; environment; distribution and socio-economics when it came to our national food systems.

The key conclusion of the discussions was that considering diet and food sustainability as separate issues is no longer credible. and that there is now an undeniable connection between choices about what we eat and the impact and increasing pace of biodiversity loss.

Journalist Jemima Lewis of The Telegraph, who co-wrote Henry Dimbleby's Sunday Times best-selling book RAVENOUS said what the pupils at Queen's College had been discussing was, "fantastic" and that she was "so pleased" with the debates being had by the pupils.




