Reception learnt about dinosaurs whilst Year 1 furthered their understanding of the Victorians with a focus on seasides.



The highlight was an exercise called "searching for the jelly baby in the flour", lots of happy faces and lots of flour covered faces. They have all worked so hard on their riding skills and it is wonderful to see them enjoying the lighter hearted aspects of riding.



Years 3, 4 and 5 had a fantastic day of Taiko drumming workshops with Lucy and Joyce from Taiko South West. The children learned good posture and listening skills and mastered several rhythms in the sessions, accompanied by energetic shouts! They had a great time and demonstrated high levels of self-control and musicality.

Junk Modelling and Instrument Making



Year 3 used assorted junk, often adding rice and pasta for sound and built their own musical instruments. They showed good planning skills and thought carefully about the desired sound of their instruments. Many built shakers, but some also attempted drums, plucked string instruments and variations on panpipes!

Year 4 used junk materials to build, mostly on a theme of robots or vehicles. Their teamwork was impressive, along with their attention to detail and their fantastic teamwork.













Outdoor Cooking



Year 3 and 4 pupils have been preparing and cooking outdoors around an open campfire. From savoury stuffed potatoes with eggs and bacon to sweets with stuffed fruits and bread over the campfire. It was an exciting hands-on experience looking at outdoor cooking. They looked at where food comes from and learnt a variety of outdoor cooking skills whilst cooking up some tasty treats.

The classes took place in the Kitchen Garden among the fruits and vegetables that the pupils had been part of growing. Pupils learnt different cooking methods from twisting dough around a stick and toasting it over hot embers to baking straight onto the embers.

"Cooking outdoors is one of life's great joys", said Mr Mann, Head of Art, Design and Food, "it is also a wonderful way to impart sensational natural flavours to your food while at the same time gain a greater appreciation of our food ".



Eco Day - Mrs Wade



The whole of the Prep school, from Reception to Year 5 (and some Year 6s), have had a fascinating day exploring environmental issues during Eco Day. They remained enthusiastic and focussed while blocking the 'Hole in my bucket', creating their own nests using tiny tweezer beaks, exploring the core of our Earth using 'cupcake core sampling' and reusing bottles to design and create their own 10 pin bowling game. We are all very grateful for the whole hearted

support of all involved, especially the lab technicians from Senior Science and Food and Nutrition.

The afternoon began with the older Prep children starting to learn about how Queen's is supporting the charity <u>Edukid</u> in Cambodia, specifically investigating the importance of creating sustainable energy within this developing country. It was rounded off by all the pupils taking part in a house drama challenge which was led by Year 5.

After playing some drama games, each house had chosen a poem to enact which explored the concept 'The Future is in our hands'. Two of the poems had been specially written by Benjamin Zephania and Kaw Tempest to help children explore these ideas through the WWF. The whole day was full of team spirit, cooperation, freedom to explore, bravery and (their newly created word) 'siblinghood'. Incidentally, these are also the meanings behind the colours of the Cambodian flag.

Queen's College House Journalism Challenge



Thursday saw the first ever Queen's College house journalism challenge, with an all-day competition to produce the best newspaper. "Media is an area of English which was significantly marginalised by the 2015 GCSE reforms; however, a grasp of media literacy and the understanding that there is no 'truth' to what is read in newspapers is a vital skill for life. Alongside teaching that, the aim was to introduce pupils to another career that must thrive in the Al-driven future," said Mrs Litton (Head of Faculty, English and Drama).

It was a rewarding day: pupils were divided into aspects of journalism that reflected scholarships (Art scholars worked on photographic journalism or graphics; Sports scholars manned the sports desk, for example) or in which we thought they would most thrive. Pupil Editors were mentored by Ken Bird, Queen's College's former Communications Director.

After lunch, food writer for The Telegraph and Masterchef judge <u>William Sitwell</u> joined us, giving pupils an inspiring talk in the Queen's Hall on careers in Journalism.

The judges - William Sitwell, Ken Bird and <u>Thomas Cock</u>, Deputy Managing Editor of Somerset Live, along with Mr Mann and Mrs Litton - judged the newspapers on five categories: leadership, written content, overall layout, range of content, and the 'Scoop Factor'.

The runner-up was Barnicott, with the overall winners being Ray, who took the trophy. Individual book prizes were awarded to Freya for her leadership skills, and Ellen for the quality of her writing.

The day was a great success, and we hope to make this challenge a biennial event. **Read the full story here.**

In his Speech Day address last July, Mark Edwards, the Chairman of the Governors, set the pupils a challenge to find ways to make Queen's more sustainable. The pupils were encouraged to use their creative skills to think outside of the box and come up with original and revolutionary ideas to help Queen's improve its impact on the environment.

On Tuesday, Years 7 to 9 pupils were led by the Year 12s in a fast-paced house competition to come up with four pitches about how they would change Queen's for the better. The students were given the brief at 08:30 and the pitches had to be submitted at 13:00, with vital house points up for grabs, time was of the essence. The Year 12's quickly organised their Houses into teams identifying what needed to be done and by when, and delegating accordingly. The

pupils only had 45 minutes to come up with a list of questions to ask a panel of experts on the school and the environment. We were very lucky to be joined by Jack Harty, who runs the Earth Centre at Kingsley School. He gave an inspirational talk to the pupils about sustainability and then acted as an environmental consultant throughout the day. All the Houses came up with some radical, compelling and well-thought-through ideas. The winners of the challenge will be announced next week in our Final Assembly.

As part of their employability week Year 10 students enjoyed a hosted visit to Plymouth University. They had the chance to hear from university staff and students about university life and opportunities. A guided campus tour was followed by lunch at the student union. A great day was had by all!

Sixth Form

Psychology Academic Poster Competition













On Tuesday the Psychology Department hosted an interschool Year 12 Academic Poster Competition.

Two other schools, Wellington and Huish, were in attendance. This event saw 21 posters entered from groups totalling 47 students. The remit for entry was to carry out an original piece of psychological research, adhering to the British Psychological Society's standards and ethics. The research could use any approved research method and entries ranged from quasi experimental, through observations to self-reports.

The students then needed to compile all the details of a psychological report in the format of an academic poster. This needed to consist of all the standard features of an academic piece of writing including an introduction, methodological procedure and results. As this was in poster format other criteria demanded that the poster was eye-catching and visually appealing.

These A1 posters were displayed in the Dining Pavilion and were judged whilst the students enjoyed lunch. Mr Speyer acted as lead judge and as Head of the Science Faculty was able to assess the scientific content of the posters. Mrs Wilde as head of Sixth Form and an outstanding English teacher was able to use her skills to make judgement about the academic standard of the written content. Miss Goodall, apart from being head of EAL, also holds a psychology degree, so was able to contribute her understanding of the topics which had been selected for research. These topics were very broad in range.

A selection of the titles which were commended by the judges are listed below. However, the judges were unanimous on their decision of the overall winner which went to two students from Huish who completed a study on 'Investigating Diffusion of Responsibility'. Mr Speyer expressed his admiration to the dedication the students went to collecting their data which involved repeatedly falling over in the dining hall to observe whether other people would come to their assistance. Additionally, comments included that this poster expressed the study clearly, used a logical organisation of material and fulfilled the remit of the assignment. The feedback from both schools was exceedingly positive. They felt that the exercise really presented a challenge to the students which really helped them reflect on the skills needed to carry out and report research in a structured and academic format. Not only did the students have to work collaboratively throughout the exercise they also had to cooperate and be flexible to work as part of a team. The students gained valuable transferable skills which will be useful as they move on to university as academic poster presentations are a favoured mode of assessment in many undergraduate degree courses.






