Last Saturday Years 7-9 were treated to a Business and Marketing activity from Humanities and a session on Secret Languages and a GCHQ Code Cracking task from the Languages faculty.

Years 10 and 11 had a joint Humanities and Science session on Rewilding and we were delighted to welcome Paddy Free (OQ) who very kindly gave up his Saturday morning to talk about his involvement with Rewilding Europe and other projects in the UK.

Years 12 and 13 had a Food and Nutrition discussion on processed Food and an English session on literature and its connection with history.

#### **European Day of Languages**




