Highgrove Nursery have been looking at vehicles and road safety this week. When the children got back to nursery, the staff then created a chalk zebra crossing across the room and the children were able to show their understanding and demonstrate their knowledge of their morning learning. The older children have also been looking at road signs and painting their own whilst talking about the colours and shapes of all the signs.



Year 2 'Guy Fawkes' Museum Service Workshop

The children were taken back in time to the year 1605 and learnt facts about the conspiracy to blow up the Houses of Parliament this week. They were fascinated to learn that Guy Fawkes had 36 barrels of gunpowder hidden under the House of Lords, ready to detonate. The children took part in three activities to consolidate their learning. The first activity was to use a quill and ink to write a warning letter to King James I; the second was to create some explosive art, using bicarbonate of soda, vinegar and paint; and the third activity was 'Pass the Bomb' where the children had to identify things they could see in historical images, as well as order the events of the plot in chronological order.

Faculty Extension Sessions



Last Saturday saw the third, of the three Faculty Extension sessions of the term. Years 7-9 were with science and English; Years 10 and 11 with languages and Food and Nutrition; and Years 12 and 13 with psychology and languages. Here is what they had to say about their sessions:

Tristan (Year 10) - "Languages and Food scholar sessions were a blast. Looking at various subjects both were superb. For both we spend an hour learning and discussing two key and important skills and problems. We started the day by learning British sign language and with Mrs McGreal, learning the alphabet and key words. This truly put our logical thinking and understanding to the test using various exercises such as ordering ourselves by our birthday month and spelling out other peoples names. After this eventful

hour we moved to food where Mr Mann talked us through the dangers and misconceptions around highlyprocessed foods (UPF's) and how it influences our day-to-day



health. He also talked through the 10 biggest food companies which control what almost all of the world eats. These were really insightful sessions." Megan (Year 9) - "I really enjoyed acting out Romeo and Juliet with Miss Watkins, as well as trying to draw the star through a mirror with Miss Harrison."

Jan-Albert (Year 13) - "I enjoyed being able to learn things outside of my current focus since its a breath of fresh air."



Francesca (Year 12) -"I found the psychology session particularly interesting, learning about the difference between neurosis and psychosis, focusing on schizophrenia, DID (dissociative identity

disorder) and psychopathy."

Henry (Year 10) - "I really enjoyed the food session, I learnt a lot about the way that food companies have a hold on the world and how processing can affect our lives."

Lola (Year 7) - "I enjoyed the biology tasks. I learned that your brain can transfer smells you've smelt before to where you were on that day and with what people you were with. When we were guessing what the items inside the boxes were. I also enjoyed the drama/English I learned about the story of Romeo and Juliet."

Florence (Year 11) - "I learnt that, surprise surprise, major food corporations want to kill us through greed and money. Paranoia!"

Adam (Year 11) - "I enjoyed all of it and I can still remember most of the sign language and it was interesting to learn about the food industry."


Meanwhile, some of our Year 12 girls - Sophia,

And finally, huge congratulations are in order - we have a new prefect! Very well done to Isla, it is very much deserved.


Sixth Form Taster Day - Mrs Chanter

OQ Weekend Last Weekend



Remembrance Weekend was one of celebration and reflection and also, for those who left in 1975, one of reminiscence. Mark Bradford encouraged a group of his contemporaries, including Nigel Bird who lives in Australia, to gather at school on Saturday afternoon for a tour. For many the physical changes to the site over almost 50 years were striking and they were particularly impressed by the Queen's Hall, the Art and Drama block,





Food the and Design building, astros, the the Birchall Hall and the facilities now enjoyed by those boarding at the school. They all came to the drinks reception at Castle House that evening where they were joined by other OQs who were able to meet the Headmaster.

On Sunday morning, Richard Kelley led a service for OQs in the Old Music Room. In his sermon the Chaplain reminded the congregation of those OQs who died in wars since 1914 and the significance of their sacrifice. The congregation moved to the front lawn where they were joined by the two school hockey teams and others who were there for the day. In the ceremony by the cross of remembrance the President of the OQs, Ben Judge, laid a wreath and the 'Last Post' was played.



The hockey players were shortly in action as they took on the OQs. Because of the conditions only one of the astros was playable so the two matches were curtailed and played alternately with the men's first half followed by the women's first half. At that stage both matches were poised at 2-2. At the end of the second periods the boys' school team were worthy winners (4-3) and the women's match ended 5-5 (though some think the OQs edged it 6-5). Whatever the outcome of that match, and neither umpire was sure, both games were high-scoring affairs and entertaining for those watching. Brunch in the main dining hall was welcomed by players and spectators alike.




