






### Accelerated Reader

**Years** 5-8



January will see the launch of Accelerated Reader for all pupils in years 5-8. This is a highly successful programme which joins up pupils, families and teachers to foster a culture of reading and help develop their skills as independent readers. There are four main aims of AR:

**To Guide** - A low-stakes test called a 'Star' test will begin the process, and with younger pupils we will encourage them to think of it as a quiz. This enables us to gauge where their independent reading skills are sitting, and guide them towards appropriate choices from the selection in both Prep school and Senior school. These are coded accordingly.

**To Engage** - The platform gives individual reading recommendations based on students' interests (gauged by their choices) and reading levels to suggest "just-right" titles. In addition, students can self-select from over 220,000 choices registered on the site, and Mrs Litton has personally sent a letter to Father Christmas to deliver books to Queen's Year 5-8 pupils this year as a way to get the buzz started.

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**To Practise** - "Just reading" becomes a thing of the past as the platform provides clear outcomes: reading quizzes monitor comprehension, while literacy skills and vocabulary quizzes extend student learning and build skills mastery. This builds comprehension and wider Literacy; and as the OECD noted, 'Reading for pleasure is the single most important indicator of a child's future success.' (Research is here)

There are 41,000 quizzes on the platform and more are being added every day; we know that children are driven by the competitive nature of online portals (e.g. 'TT Rockstars') and AR will have similar incentives (and glory).

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**To Grow** - Pupils can retake the STAR test when it is clear that they are ready for more ambitious texts; we will be able to see whose reading is growing, and also who is not independently reading (and thus enable us to step in and support those pupils).

Mrs Litton and Mrs Kelly will be hosting a Parental Engagement Evening on January 24th at 7pm to give details on how the platform works and how best to support your child in becoming an autonomous, keen reader. Details will be sent by Mrs McAlonan. Further information about AR can be found here.

We would like to make more reading nooks/spaces like the one we currently have outside the Senior English classrooms. If any parents have any unwanted and in good condition, beanbags or large floor cushions, they would be greatly received by the English department to help create these spaces.

#### **Rowbarton Pantry**



On Tuesday Rev. Kelley, Mrs Foster and some of Year 6 visited Rowbarton Methodist church to go and see how the Prep School's Harvest donations were being used in their pantry. It was great to meet the volunteers who run the pantry every week and to see how the entire project works. Rowbarton Pantry feeds its 45 member families every week (around 70 people in total) by providing around £30 worth of food for a

small weekly membership fee of £3.50. Fresh food is provided by FareShare (the cost of the membership fee) and ambient food through donations, including from our Prep School. Our students got to experience the entire shopping experience, to visit the storerooms, and even to help with unloading the fresh supplies from FareShare as they arrived. It was both incredible to see what a difference our donations had made to local people's lives but also hugely humbling as we got back on the bus to return to the abundance of our school lunch.

Rowbarton pantry, like all pantry projects, always has more demand for its services than it has food supply and so the volunteers wanted to pass on their heartfelt thanks to all of you who donated at Harvest. We are sure they would be equally grateful for any additional donations people would like to make to them this Christmas.

#### Queen's Enterprise week



In chapel this week, the Enterprise Award CC students launched Queen's Enterprise Week to senior students. They shared an outline of what enterprise skills are, such as problem solving and use of initiative and why they are important even if you are not thinking of running your own business. In their presentation the group outlined how students can develop their enterprise skills whilst in school and highlighted that they are skills that need to be developed as students progress through school rather than as an afterthought when looking for work. Examples were given of activities that students could be involved in, such as being part of or leading a team or persevering on a particularly difficult topic or task and not seeing failure as a reason

to give up. Competitions that each key stage could get involved in were also announced:

Years 7-9: Create a poster on either of the following themes:

- •Enterprise skills
- •Your favourite entrepreneur

**Years 10 - 13:** Essay Competition answering the question: Why is learning from failure sometimes more effective than learning from success? Building upon your own experiences and/or examples of entrepreneurs who were able to learn from failure.

All Senior Students: Aim to be awarded the MOST class charts points for demonstrating enterprise skills. Awards will be given to the students in each year group with the most points.

#### **Preparing Venison**

This week pupils in food and nutrition learnt how to prepare a deer fresh from the shoot, skinning it, breaking it down into its primal cuts and were even taught how to debone and prepare a haunch of venison before cooking up some tasty venison steak.

The lessons on food provenance and food sustainability were delivered by a local visiting BASC Deer Manager, John Mews, who explained how through deer management he protects local habitats and other



associated species, forestry and agricultural crops. Pupils learnt why we should all be eating more wild venison to save Britain's countryside with a record number of deer — more than two million — eating their way through the UK's countryside and crops with more deer roaming the British countryside than any time in history. While deer are an essential part of ecosystems, in current numbers, they threaten the long-term viability.

#### **Prep Christmas Fayre**




