

Mrs Matthews explained that dogs are also mammals and that puppies stay with their mummies until they are weaned at 8 weeks old. We also learned that there are many breeds of dogs in different shapes and sizes and that they need exercise and can eat dry food or meat.

We love our playtimes and we are busy learning some traditional playground games. We have learned how to play Mousetrap, In and Out the Dusty Bluebells, Duck Duck Goose and Oranges and Lemons. We are also learning how to clap in time and although we can't do it YET, we will keep practising until we can!

With the score line 1-0 at half-time, a perfectly executed move from midfield led to an impressive shot from Henry across the goal for Reece to smash over the line to make it 2-0.

Wellington continued to provide an aerial threat and a long ball over the top was missed by the hosts and resulted in a tap-in for the visitors (2-1).

Player of the match Ali once again proved to be the difference between the two sides with a fast break away and stinging shot easing the pressure and concluding the scoring for an epic 3-1 win Queen's.

Students were allocated countries, and topics were debated and resolutions formed as if the issues were being debated in the years stated. It was a different but

The students excelled themselves and were brilliantly prepared; it was wonderful to see how their confidence had grown over the last couple of years to the point where all were speaking, lobbying and debating with confidence and precision. Particular mention should go to Nelly who was a highly commended delegate in her committee and Rebecca who was a commended delegate in the Security Council. Well done to you both and to the other seven Queen's students who represented the College brilliantly.

Macbeth Trip - Adam Year 11

The theatre foyer of the Old Vic in Bristol contained within it a sparkly bar full of all kinds of glimmering drinks that glinted at you the moment you stepped foot in the place as if they were attempting to show off. A fair number of tables and chairs were dotted around the foyer that were, in all honesty, nothing to marvel at but the actual stage and seating we were directed to by the staff certainly caught the eye. The theatre boasts three layers of seating and on this particular night very few chairs were empty. Clearly year 11 and 10 were in for a treat if the people of Bristol thought it to be good enough to nearly sell out the place.

The play that we had all made the drive to see was a modernisation of the famous and well known play of "Macbeth" that any English GCSE student ought to know like the back of their hand.

Unlike its Shakespearean predecessor this play opens up on Lady Macbeth

as she receives his letter detailing the witches prophecy that states he shall be king. However this was not a letter but instead a video call that was projected onto the set. These projectors are used frequently in the play and were crucial in allowing the audience to see the play well, conveying the modern nature of the play as well as keeping everyone's attention firmly fixed to the stage. Another interesting choice made by the play was the representation of the witches. The scene is revealed through clever effects directly after the murder of Duncan in such a way that it emphasises the witches power and how they've affected Macbeth mentally. The greatest choice was the inclusion of showing some action. In this modern age of technology and short form content a play with no action is completely incompatible with today's youth therefore by showing the odd murder here and there the cast retained the audience's attention span well. The action was so intense that Macduff was able to attain his revenge not by slaying Macbeth's kin as the tyrant Macbeth had none to slew.

Year 13 A level PE Somerset Cricket Sport Analytics Tour By Hayden Year 13



On Friday the 26 January, the Year 13 A level PE students went on a trip to Somerset County Cricket Club to hear about how sports analytics has changed through the years, and how cricket technology for analysis has improved. The talk was given by Scott Thomas, he was very welcoming and clearly loved his job!

The talk started with Scott telling us about his choices leading up to this job and what

his job consists of. He explained how the technology for analysing each specific player in detail has improved, with new technologies such as high accuracy GPS trackers, chips in the cricket balls to analyse ball speed, and many more. The main part of Scott's job is to brief the captain and coaching staff before every match with specific details on the opposing team such as, where to bowl to certain people based on their last 30 matches, what fielder to place to what bowler based on past matches. He plays a very key role within the team.

In terms of our A-level PE this trip helped us understand how with the improvement in technology the standard of sport is also improving. It helped us understand the role the England cricket board (ECB) has within county cricket. We would all like to thank Scott for his time, and thank Mrs Chanter for taking the time to organise and drive us there!


